## COURSE CONTENT:

### 1. Practical Methodology Workshops on Teaching English as a Foreign Language (3, 4 or 5 days)

conducted by expert teacher trainers with many years of experience in training European teachers of English and a wealth of exciting ideas to impart.

The workshops will explore a wide range of teaching ideas and activities designed to motivate students and make language lessons more enjoyable and worthwhile. Some or all of the following will be included:

- a variety of motivating activities which engage students' imaginations and creativity - innovative role play and drama activities, use of the media, poetry and stories (based on the European Lingua Project: "Staging Foreign Language Learning")
- learner styles and learner training - different strategies for differentiation
- increasing motivation and inclusivity in the classroom
- developing learner autonomy
- language analysis for teaching
- all four skills - particularly integrated tasks
- stimulating ideas for exploiting textbooks
- creative writing activities
- correction and feedback strategies
- evaluation and assessment
- using authentic materials
- grammar activities
- teaching vocabulary
- the Lexical Approach
- task based learning
- recent developments in English
- relevance of World Englishes and ELF to the language classroom

Teachers will be encouraged to share their own ideas and experiences and to participate in practical activities.

**A wide range of ready-made teaching materials will be provided.**

The workshop will include **ADVANCED LANGUAGE PRACTICE**, giving teachers the opportunity to polish their own language skills.

- ▲ The Gloucester 29 July – 10 August and Portsmouth 26 August – 7 September courses focus on improving teachers' own language skills (with 24 hours of **language tuition** as well as methodology workshops).
- The Southampton 12 -24 August and 11-19 August courses focus on **USING NEW TECHNOLOGY IN LANGUAGE LEARNING** and **MOTIVATION FOR LEARNING + LEARNING-TO-LEARN SKILLS**
- The Ipswich 17-29 June course and Cardiff 30 September – 12 October course focus on **USING NEW TECHNOLOGY FOR TEACHING ENGLISH**

### 4. Shakespeare's Theatre:

A visit to Stratford-upon-Avon with an option to see a play at the Royal Shakespeare Theatre, preceded by a workshop on Shakespeare's Theatre (Cheltenham & Gloucester courses), or an optional visit to a Shakespeare play at Shakespeare's Globe Theatre in London preceded by a workshop on Shakespeare's Theatre (Summer courses in Southampton & Portsmouth)

The Dunfermline 5-17 August course will take place during the **Edinburgh International Festival and Festival Fringe**, which offer a huge choice of literary and cultural events, and the Edinburgh Tattoo. (Edinburgh is a short rail journey from Dunfermline.)

Optional excursions and theatre visits are not included in the price. (Theatre tickets cost about 25 – 40 Euro)

### (b) HOST FAMILY ACCOMMODATION

 (as detailed on Page 1 & 2) to include:

Full board accommodation with a local family (inclusive of registration fee): 8 or 12 nights  
(Teachers may request to be the only guest of their mother tongue or to stay in the same family as a colleague).

Host families are carefully selected and offer a friendly welcome and opportunities to chat and learn more about life in Britain today. Participants often find that the experience of staying with a host family is one of the most memorable aspects of the course. Accommodation is in single rooms (unless participants request to share). Breakfast, packed lunch and evening meal are provided by the host family. (Food allergies, likes and dislikes are taken into account.)

Please note that many of the suitable residential areas are not within walking distance of the town centre, and most host families are an easy bus ride from the town centre/tuition centre. Local transport from host families to the town centre and local colleges is at the participants' own expense and is likely to cost 15-30 Euro per week.

Additional nights with host families can be arranged, giving participants extra time for individual research and visits. Accommodation can be provided for family members (but not unaccompanied children) subject to availability. (Rates on request).

**PAYMENT:** Full payment will be due 2 months before the course begins, or for teachers awaiting Grundtvig funding – as soon as the Grundtvig grant is received. Cancellation charges apply for cancellations 4 weeks or less before the course commences. 3-4 weeks before arrival: cancellation fee: 380 Euros. No refund for cancellations within 3 weeks of arrival. Cancellation insurance can be arranged through Endsleigh Insurance.

**PREPARATION:** Participants complete a detailed questionnaire before the course starts to ascertain their level of experience and training, as well as the age groups and types of learners they teach. Suggestions for pre-course reading are given.

**OUTCOMES:** By the end of the course participants will have:

- Gained a wide variety of new ideas, skills and materials for teaching English
- Updated their knowledge of the English Language, the UK and the Education System
- Established links with other teachers from different European Countries

**EVALUATION:** At the end of the course teachers participate in a detailed evaluation of the course.

**FOLLOW UP:** At the end of the course teachers are asked to consider which aspects of the course will be the most relevant to their own teaching situations. On their return they are invited to keep a record of how they have been able to utilise ideas gained on the course in their own classrooms. They are encouraged to share their experiences with their fellow participants by email. Teachers will also have email access to the teacher trainers for discussion and advice after the course.

## LOCATIONS:

**CHELTENHAM, England:** Population: 108,000; 98 miles (157 kilometres) west of London (2¼ hours by rail)  
Cheltenham is an elegant spa town, situated on the edge of the Cotswold Hills, which are famous for their picturesque stone villages. Cheltenham is known for its Regency architecture, colourful parks and gardens and it has many attractive residential areas.  
The most convenient airports: Heathrow (direct National Express Coach to Cheltenham), Birmingham (rail to Cheltenham) or Bristol (airport bus then rail to Cheltenham)

**EXETER, England:** Population: 105,000; 190 miles (305 kilometres) south-west of London (2½ hours by rail).  
Exeter is an historic city with a magnificent Gothic cathedral, many lovely old buildings and a variety of interesting museums. It is the county town of Devon, situated in beautiful hilly countryside, close to the South Devon coast and Dartmoor National Park.  
The most convenient airports: Exeter (bus to city centre), Bristol (airport bus then rail or coach to Exeter) or Heathrow (direct National Express Coach to Exeter)

**GLOUCESTER, England:** Population: 105,000; 105 miles (170 kilometres) west of London (2 hours by rail).  
Gloucester is an ancient city with a magnificent medieval cathedral and cloister, as well as being a lively modern town. The historic docks have been impressively restored to include various museums, shops and cafes. The city is close to the spectacular countryside of the Cotswolds Hills, the Wye Valley and the Forest of Dean.  
The most convenient airports: Heathrow (direct National Express Coach to Gloucester) or Birmingham (rail to Gloucester) or Bristol (airport bus then rail to Gloucester)

**MAIDSTONE, England:** Population: 140,000; 37 miles (55 kilometres) south-east of London (1 hour by rail).  
Maidstone is situated in the beautiful county of Kent within easy reach of London and the coast. It is a pleasant town with various historic buildings including a medieval archbishop's palace. One of its chief attractions is the wealth of charming villages in the surrounding countryside.  
The most convenient airports: All London Airports (Gatwick, Heathrow, Luton, Stansted, City) – travel to Maidstone via central London

**PORTSMOUTH, England:** Population: 190,000; 75 miles (120 kilometres) south-west of London (1½ hours by rail).  
Portsmouth, situated on the south coast, is an important port, famous for its historic ships - most notably Nelson's "Victory". Old Portsmouth overlooks the busy historic maritime harbour, while the attractive seaside resort area of Southsea, with its parks and gardens and two piers, has four miles of seafont with views across to the Isle of Wight.  
The most convenient airports: Southampton (rail to Portsmouth), Heathrow (direct National Express coach to Portsmouth) or Gatwick (direct coach or rail to Portsmouth)

**SHREWSBURY, England:** Population: 96,000; 153 miles (245 kilometres) north-west of London (2½ hours by rail).  
Shrewsbury, the county town of Shropshire, is a delightful old town, picturesquely situated in a bend of the River Severn. It has a wealth of historic buildings, including a castle and many half-timbered and Georgian houses, as well as several interesting museums. Shrewsbury is surrounded by lovely countryside and is only a short distance from the Welsh border.  
The most convenient airports: Birmingham (rail to Shrewsbury) or Manchester (rail to Shrewsbury) or Liverpool (airport bus then rail to Shrewsbury)

**SOUTHAMPTON, England:** Population: 220,000; 80 miles (128 kilometres) south-west of London (1¼ hours by rail).  
Southampton is a pleasant university town and an important port situated on the south coast, within easy reach of the New Forest, Winchester, Salisbury, Portsmouth, Bournemouth and the Isle of Wight. There is an historic old town, interesting museums, a new waterside development and an excellent shopping centre.  
The most convenient airports: Southampton (rail to city centre), Heathrow (direct National Express coach to Southampton) or Gatwick (direct coach or rail to Southampton)

**CARDIFF, Wales:** Population: 330,000; 150 miles (240 kilometres) from London (2¼ hours by rail).  
Cardiff, the capital city of Wales, situated on the south coast of Wales, is a lively cultural centre. Its attractions include: Cardiff Bay, Cardiff Castle, National Museum and Gallery and Llandaff Cathedral. Nearby are the Open-Air Museum of Welsh Life, Caerphilly Castle, the Brecon Beacons National Park and beautiful coastal scenery and beaches.  
The most convenient airports: Cardiff (rail or bus to city centre), Heathrow (direct National Express coach to Cardiff) or Bristol (airport bus then rail to Cardiff)

**DUNFERMLINE, Scotland:** Population: 56,000; 16 miles (25 kilometres) north of Edinburgh.  
Dunfermline, the ancient capital of Scotland, boasts a famous ancient abbey and a lovely park. It lies on the northern side of the Firth of Forth, at the southern gateway to the Scottish Highlands, and is ideally placed for visits to Edinburgh and to some of the most beautiful scenery of Scotland.  
The most convenient airport: Edinburgh (direct Stagecoach 747 bus to Inverkeithing, which adjoins Dunfermline)

**BELFAST, Northern Ireland:** Population: 277,000. Belfast, the capital of Northern Ireland, is a lively city with excellent shopping and leisure facilities. The seaside resort of Bangor and the Ulster (Open-Air) Folk and Transport Museum are nearby. The beautiful Antrim coast and world famous Giant's Causeway and Dublin are within easy reach.  
Belfast has two airports: Belfast City (bus to city centre – 20 minutes) or Belfast International (bus to city centre – 40 minutes)

**IPSWICH, England:** Population: 120,000; 90 miles (144 kilometres) north-east of London (1¼ hours by rail).  
Ipswich, the county town of Suffolk, is situated close to the unspoilt Suffolk coast and to many picturesque villages. It has an attractive waterfront and some noteworthy historic buildings, including a fine Tudor mansion.  
The most convenient airport: Stansted (direct National Express coach to Ipswich) or other London airports (rail/coach via Central London to Ipswich)

These towns (unlike popular south coast resorts and tourist centres such as Oxford and Cambridge) are not overcrowded with overseas students and offer a typically British environment in which to study.

## TRAVEL:

Transport at the beginning and end of the course is not provided and International Study Programmes regrets that it is unable to assist with travel arrangements. Please check the most convenient airports above. If arriving at other airports, travel to the course location is generally via central London by coach or rail.
