These courses are designed for secondary and vocational school teachers who teach their subject 'bilingually' in English and for their English language colleagues.

Ideally two or more teachers from the same school should attend. However, individual subject teachers or English teachers are also welcome to attend.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

This course aims to provide teachers with the opportunity:

- To consider C.L.I.L. methodology and to acquire expertise and fresh ideas for teaching subjects such as science & maths, history, geography & other humanities & vocational subjects in English
- To acquire ready-made teaching materials and to evaluate, adapt and create materials for teaching their subject(s) in English,
- To consider ways of working inter- and intra- departmentally
- To consider the role and value of first language in second language learning
- To consider the role of the language teacher in the CLIL programme
- To learn about new ideas about language and content in the classroom
- To learn about different classroom tasks and task design
- To establish relationships and networks with colleagues from other countries
- To appraise different ways of 'work-sharing' for lesson and course preparation and assessment
- To consider the challenges of change in an educational environment

COURSE CONTENT:

1. Workshops on Content and Language Integrated Learning (C.L.I.L.) Methodology:

Collegiality will be an important feature of this course, with a focus on cooperation between subject teachers and English language teachers in order to achieve a shared responsibility for the successful and meaningful delivery of CLIL lessons. We will look at the grammar requirements for CLIL subjects, vocabulary teaching and assessment strategies and the way these features can be shared across the teaching team. We will also consider ways in which the language teacher can help prepare students for CLIL classes.

The workshops will be interactive. There will be a theoretical explanation and underpinning for the tasks.

Materials will cover the age range 12-19. Bibliographical details and materials including textbooks will be available.

2. Visit to South Wales from Cheltenham, St Fagans Open Air Museum of Welsh Life & History from Cardiff, Winchester from Portsmouth

LOCATIONS:

CHELTENHAM, ENGLAND: Population: 108,000; 98 miles (157 kilometres) west of London (2¼ hours by rail)

Cheltenham is an elegant spa town, situated on the edge of the Cotswold Hills, which are famous for their picturesque stone villages. Cheltenham is known for its Regency architecture, colourful parks and gardens and it has many attractive residential areas.

The most convenient airports: Heathrow (direct National Express Coach to Cheltenham), Birmingham (rail to Cheltenham) or Bristol (airport bus then rail to Cheltenham)

CARDIFF, Wales: Population: 330,000; 150 miles (240 kilometres) from London (2¼ hours by rail).

Cardiff, the capital city of Wales, situated on the south coast of Wales, is a lively cultural centre. Its attractions include: Cardiff Bay, Cardiff Castle, National Museum and Gallery and Llandaff Cathedral. Nearby are the Open-Air Museum of Welsh Life, Caerphilly Castle, the Brecon Beacons National Park and beautiful coastal scenery and beaches.

The most convenient airports: Cardiff Airport (rail or bus to city centre), Heathrow or Bristol Airports (direct National Express coach from both to Cardiff)

PORTSMOUTH, England: Population: 190,000; 75 miles (120 kilometres) south-west of London (1½ hours by rail).

Portsmouth, situated on the south coast, is an important port, famous for its historic ships - most notably Nelson's "Victory". Old Portsmouth overlooks the busy historic maritime harbour, while the attractive seaside resort area of Southsea, with its parks and gardens and two piers, has four miles of seafront with views across to the Isle of Wight.

The most convenient airports: Southampton (rail to Portsmouth), Heathrow (direct National Express coach to Portsmouth) or Gatwick (direct coach or rail to Portsmouth)

(a) **COURSE FEE:** to include:

Full programme of study sessions and visits as itemized above.

NB. Participants are responsible for paying their own daily transport costs.
Optional excursions are not included in the price.

(b) **HOST FAMILY ACCOMMODATION** to include:

Full board accommodation with a local family (inclusive of registration fee): 8 nights
(Teachers may request to be the only guest of their mother tongue or to stay in the same family as a colleague).

Host families are carefully selected and offer a friendly welcome and opportunities to chat and learn more about life in Britain today. Participants often find that the experience of staying with a host family is one of the most memorable aspects of the course. Accommodation is in single rooms (unless participants request to share). Breakfast, packed lunch and evening meal are provided by the host family. (Food allergies, likes and dislikes are taken into account.)

Please note that many of the suitable residential areas are not within walking distance of the town centre, and most host families are an easy bus ride from the town centre/tuition centre. Local transport from host families to the town centre is at the participants' own expense and is likely to cost 15-30 Euro per week.

Additional nights with host families can be arranged, giving participants extra time for individual research and visits. Accommodation can be provided for family members (but not unaccompanied children) subject to availability. (Rates on request).

PAYMENT:

Full payment will be due 2 months before the course begins, or for teachers awaiting funding – as soon as the grant is received. Cancellation charges apply for cancellations 4 weeks or less before the course commences. 3-4 weeks before arrival: cancellation fee: 380 Euros. No refund for cancellations within 3 weeks of arrival. Applicants are strongly advised to take out cancellation insurance.

TRAVEL:

Transport at the beginning and end of the course is not provided and International Study Programmes regrets that it is unable to assist with travel arrangements. Please check the most convenient airports above. If arriving at other airports, travel to the course location is generally via central London by coach or rail.
